There are 7 topics covered in the eco school scheme these are Biodiversity, Energy, Litter, Waste, Water, School Grounds, Healthy Living, Transport and Global Citizenship. This term we have been working on three of these topics - Healthy Living, Litter and Waste.

After conducting a review of the school, we saw many positive things we do to lessen our impact on the environment, but we also identified areas we could improve on. This newsletter has been created to inform you about all the things we have done this term as part of our commitment to make the school more eco.

We have gained our Bronze eco certificate and are now working towards our silver certificate.



Healthy Living

The importance of Healthy Eating: Eating a healthy, balanced diet plays an essential role in maintaining a healthy weight, which is an important part of overall good health. Being unhealthy can lead to being overweight or obese which can lead to health conditions such as type 2 diabetes, certain cancers, heart disease or strokes. In Food Technology we have made sure we get all the vitamins, carbohydrates and proteins we need to maintain our health. For example: soups – lentil, tomato and bacon, and leek and potato soup. Also egg and vegetable frittatas and pasta bakes.

Cleaning Products

When we analysed our eco-schools review, we noticed that the cleaning products we were using were not only damaging to aquatic life, but also to us. The chemicals released into the atmosphere are harmful to us and can contribute to health problems. Therefore, we substituted the old brands with new ones: Greenscents and Ecozone. These companies have a better eco rating on the "good shopping guide ethical company index". One of our existing products scored 35, whilst Ecozone got 95 out of 100.

The ethical consumer investigated 25 toilet cleaners and gave them marks out of 20 based on ethical criteria. Our existing toilet cleaner was given a rating of 4.5, Greenscents a rating of 16.5 (the highest).

For surface cleaners the guide gave our existing spray spray a 4.5 rating and Greenscents cleaning spray 16.5, top of the table. We are now in the process of testing the efficiency of these brands and so far the results are looking positive.

Waste Week

Alongside other schools throughout the country Immanuel Christian School participated in Waste Week during 5-9 March. The focus for the 2018 national waste saving campaign was food waste and packaging. During the Monday assembly Mrs Gulliford hid 10 facts on waste around the school. Pupils had to find these facts and read them out to the rest of the



school. The amount of wasted food and excess packaging in the UK was shocking. Pupils talked about the importance of not wasting food. Mrs Gulliford challenged pupils to waste no food all week and recycle packaging. Some pupils also designed packed lunches that didn't use any throw away packaging such as crisp packets, cling film and bar wrappers.

On the Tuesday and Thursday of the week pupils bought in clothes that their family no longer needed but could be worn by other people. These were collected and can now be reused.

Less waste at lunchtime

The school now have a small compost caddy so that children and staff can put food such as banana skins and apple cores in rather then chuck them in the main bin. Children have also been asked to take any packaging home in their lunch box so that it can be properly recycled.



Reusable Handtowels

Handtowels have been upcycled from old Bath Towels to reduce the amount of paper towels that the school throw away. They are also washed in eco washing powder to reduce any harmful impact on the environment.
